Elections Affect Legislation

For a bill to be signed into federal law, it has to pass in both chambers of Congress (the US House and the US Senate) and then be signed by the President.

On so many policies, including those related to abortion, the Republican and Democrat parties are at opposite ends of the spectrum.

Therefore, to get any laws enacted in either direction regarding abortion, the same party needs to control the House, the Senate and the White House at the same time. And that doesn't happen very often, as the list below shows.

(Moreover, when we say "control," that often means that in the Senate, there needs to be not only a majority, but 60 votes. Otherwise a bill cannot get past the objections of the minority party.)

The list below shows not only when the same party controlled the Congress and the White House, but what pro-life and pro-abortion bills became federal law as a result.

One of the key reasons that progress is slow is divided government. Elections can change that.

<u>2003 – Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act</u>

(Republican House; Republican Senate; twice vetoed by Democratic President, but signed into law by Republican President) – Congress first passed this bill in 1995 and then in 1997 and it was vetoed both times by Democrat President Bill Clinton. Congress passed it again in 2003 and Republican President George W. Bush signed the measure into law.

2004 – Unborn Victims of Violence Act

Passed by Congress in 2004 and signed into law by President George W. Bush, the Unborn Victims of Violence Act amended the federal criminal code to include an unborn child at any stage of development as a separate victim when injured or killed as the consequence of an attack on his or her mother.
